This newsletter will cover some of the places our teams have been this year and the training and preaching we got to do. We will also give a harvest field report and provide an update on my family on the back of the newsletter.

Harvest Field Report

- 625,000 people have heard the Gospel so far this year
- 547 teams have gone out to share the Gospel
- 12 Babies have been saved from death. Keep praying!
- 27,855 tracts have been given out
- 52 people have been trained in evangelism
- 35 Bibles have been handed out
- 115 people said they are Christians only 5 could share biblically sound Gospel.
- 1,098 Individual Gospel conversations

I The Lord Have Spoken



I am reading the book of Ezekiel right now, and as I was reading this morning, the last five words of Ezekiel 5:17 stuck in my mind and heart, "I, the Lord, have spoken." Because they had sought other gods and sacrificed their children to these other gods, God would judge them with pestilence, the sword, and famine. The above paragraph is sobering and heart-wrenching. It should encourage us because the Lord has spoken; we can take His truth to His creation and allow them to respond to the mercy found in Jesus. This year, we went to the Middle East to encourage missionaries because the Lord has spoken. We traveled to different states and towns throughout America this year, from Hollywood, California, to Fort Myers, Florida, because God has spoken. This year, we taught and preached in Maputo, Mozambique, because God has spoken. There is a standard—the Bible—that everyone will submit to now or be judged later.

It is our job as a ministry to humbly take this word to them and give them the opportunity right now to believe in Jesus. We need urgency and brokenness over our sins and our nation's sins.

Our Time At The Fair And Finishing Strong

We sent nine different teams out to the state fair this year. Over 100,000 people heard the Gospel from our teams this year. Over 7,000 tracts were given out. Many Christians were encouraged in their faith, unbelievers asked about true salvation, and mockers hurled insults.

Our need to finish strong financially has never been more critical with the goals we have set for our ten-year vision. We are behind on our faith budget this year, around 65k. Our Trip To The Middle East



We were able to go in and encourage missionaries who are working through how to start an international church. They sacrifice creature comforters when serving the Lord in their context. The physical heat in the Middle East, at sunset and hours after, can still be 95 degrees. The A/C units do not work, so they mostly sleep and live in non-air-conditioned homes. They open the windows to let the air in, and the house fills with dust and noise from the street below.

At times, people blare loudspeakers containing the reading of the Qur'an right toward their homes. It can blast eight hours a day when people find out the missionaries are not Muslim. This is part of living as a missionary in the Middle East.

Our Time In Mozambique

The picture on (Pg 1) is of two churches that came together for an evangelism conference that I led on how to share their faith with opposing beliefs. The older guy on the far right of the picture (Pg 1) thanked me for making the teaching so clear and full of practical application. This is very humbling. Thank you for allowing me to go over and serve the body of Christ this way.

We also got to be a part of advising on a water project that will bring water to a village without water since 2019. The government has forgotten about these people and their needs, but Jesus has not. This will be a fantastic opportunity to talk about Jesus, the true living water that gave this village their needed physical water.
